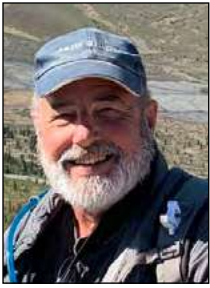

The Drawing Board

Each month a different member of the CWA Board of Directors has the opportunity to write an art-related article for our members.

Painting the American Spirit: The Hudson River School and America's 250th Anniversary by Joe Tringali

As America celebrates its 250th anniversary in 2026, we have an opportunity to reflect not only on the people and events that shaped our nation, but also on the landscapes that inspired generations of Americans. Long before photography became widespread, artists helped define how Americans viewed their country. Among the most influential were the painters of the Hudson River School, America's first great artistic movement.

Founded in the early nineteenth century by Thomas Cole, the Hudson River School was not a formal school but a group of artists united by a shared vision. They painted the Hudson River Valley, the Catskill Mountains, the Adirondacks, New England, and eventually the vast wilderness of the American West. Their work celebrated the beauty, grandeur, and promise of the American landscape at a time when the young nation was still defining its identity.

While Europe looked to its cathedrals, castles, and ancient history for artistic inspiration, the Hudson River School artists found America's greatness in its rivers, forests, mountains, and skies. Through their paintings, they helped Americans see the natural landscape as a source of national pride.

Today, nearly two centuries later, their work continues to resonate. Their paintings remind us that the American landscape is not simply scenery—it is part of our shared heritage.

The Art of Awe

What makes a Hudson River School painting instantly recognizable is its extraordinary sense of atmosphere, light, distance, and drama.

The artists mastered atmospheric perspective, allowing distant mountains to fade into soft blue haze while foreground details remained crisp and richly colored. This created a remarkable sense of depth and scale, inviting viewers to travel visually through the painting.

Light was often the emotional centerpiece. Sunrises, sunsets, and shafts of sunlight breaking through clouds transformed ordinary landscapes into scenes of wonder. The artists used light not merely to illuminate the landscape but to evoke feelings of hope, discovery, and reverence.

Their compositions often emphasized distance. Rivers wound toward the horizon, valleys opened into vast panoramas, and tiny human figures underscored the immensity of the natural world. The viewer was encouraged to contemplate both the grandeur of nature and humanity's place within it.

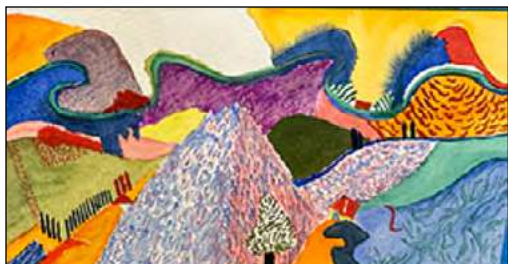

Vets Study a Master to Understand His Choice of Colors by Sheila Cain



Source for Vet group — *Mulholland Drive: The Road to the Studio* by David Hockney
The painting is a diptych and measures 7 ft. 2 in. high x 20 ft. 3 in. in wide. Painted in 1980, it was Hockney's largest canvas at the time. It was completed in just a few weeks. It's based on his regular drive from his home in the Hollywood Hills to his studio in Los Angeles.



The Oakland veterans have been studying David Hockney's playful diptych, *Mulholland Drive: The Road to the Studio*, to better understand his use of color and palette choices. At first glance, the painting appears simple: bright blues, oranges, reds, and greens spread across a landscape. A closer look reveals a wealth of details—cypress trees dotting the hillsides, vineyards, a swimming pool, winding roads, and rolling mountains. It takes a master simplifier to loosely draw and simplify this.

To begin the project, everyone received fresh watercolor pigments and was introduced to watercolor pencils as an additional tool. The goal was to loosely recreate the composition while studying Hockney's colors and charting them on a separate piece of paper. As we began drawing, someone asked: Isn't using watercolor pencils cheating? It is a mindset we hope to leave behind. Watercolor is not limited to paint applied with a brush. The challenge is simply to get watercolor onto the paper in whatever way best serves the artwork. It is always a bonus when it lands exactly where you intended.



By the second session, both veterans and volunteers were nearing completion. When we displayed the paintings side by side, the results were remarkable. Everyone had interpreted the same composition differently, revealing their own artistic voice while learning from the master. We did have a master simplifier among us, Lorraine. She reduced three mountains to one and introduced a color not found in Hockney's original painting. The result was a fresh and successful interpretation that remained true to the spirit of the composition.



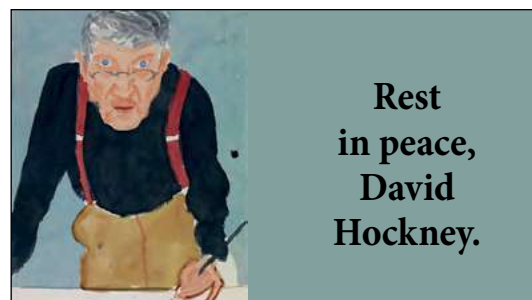

In Diane's painting she didn't copy Hockney's color per se, but captured her own beautiful quality of light. Hockney's light is the bright California sunshine of Los Angeles—a place he loved so much that he often described himself as a "British Angeleno."

As we gathered to view the finished paintings, we learned the news that David Hockney had passed away the day before. His death gave our study an unexpected significance. Through this project, we had the opportunity to spend time with his ideas, learn from his remarkable vision, and gain a deeper appreciation for his art.

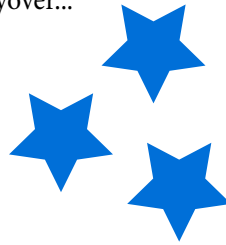

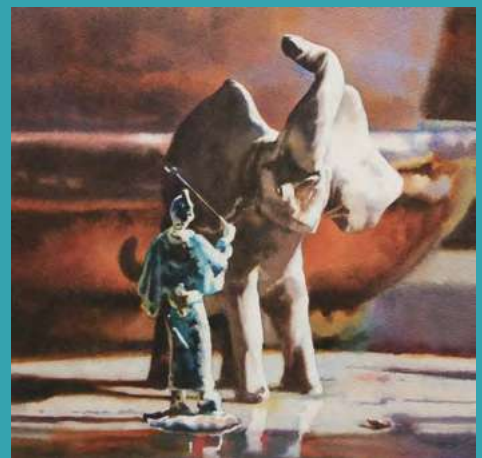

Perhaps most memorable were their skies. Towering clouds, approaching storms, and glowing horizons were never just backgrounds. The sky became an active storyteller, setting the mood and directing the viewer's eye throughout the composition.

Lessons for Today's Watercolor Artists

Although separated from us by nearly 200 years, the Hudson River School artists continue to offer valuable lessons for painters today.

Use atmosphere to create depth. As objects recede into the distance, they soften edges, reduce detail, and shift colors toward cooler blues and grays.

Make the light the focal point. Preserve your brightest highlights and use value contrast to draw attention to the areas that matter most.

Build paintings in layers. Strong foreground, middle ground, and background elements help create a convincing sense of space.

Let the sky tell the story. Whether calm or dramatic, the sky can establish mood, movement, and emotional impact.

Many contemporary watercolorists combine these timeless principles with the freer brushwork and color exploration of Impressionism, creating paintings that feel both expansive and fresh.

Celebrating America Through Art

As artists, we can honor America's 250th anniversary in much the same way the Hudson River School painters celebrated the nation in their own time—by observing and painting the landscapes around us.

We need not travel to the Hudson Valley or the Rocky Mountains. Inspiration can be found in the places we know best: a local creek, an oak-studded hillside, a coastal bluff, a vineyard, a historic downtown, or a favorite trail.

In Northern California, we are especially fortunate. The rolling hills of the East Bay, the redwood forests, the Sierra Nevada, the Sacramento Delta, and the dramatic Pacific coastline offer endless opportunities to explore the same themes of light, atmosphere, and grandeur that inspired the Hudson River School artists.

As we commemorate 250 years of American history, perhaps there is no better tribute than to step outdoors with sketchbook or paintbrush in hand and capture the beauty of the land that continues to inspire us.

Thomas Cole once wrote that the most distinctive characteristic of American scenery was its "wildness." Nearly two centuries later, that spirit remains. Through our paintings, we join a long tradition of artists who celebrate the American landscape and preserve its beauty for future generations.

Major Artists

Thomas Cole – Generally regarded as the founder. His paintings often combined natural beauty with moral and historical themes.

Asher B. Durand – Known for detailed woodland scenes and reverence for nature.

Frederic Edwin Church – Cole's student; famous for monumental landscapes such as *The Heart of the Andes*.

Albert Bierstadt – Celebrated for spectacular paintings of the Rocky Mountains and Yosemite.

Jasper Francis Cropsey – Renowned for brilliant autumn landscapes

John Frederick Kensett – Known for serene, luminous scenes.

June Demo Recap: Thomas W. Schaller by Lis MacDonald



Painting title: *Still Standing, Havana*

The CWA demo for June featured the renowned and award-winning artist Thomas W. Schaller, who demonstrated how to paint a mansion in Havana, Cuba. He used a vertical composition replacing the original horizontal photo to strengthen the "heaven and earth" theme.

He stressed interpretation over imitation, altering the image to improve the design. He kept the reference photo hidden while the painting developed from a value sketch and intuition. The painting was built from light to dark: paper whites first, then light midtones, dark midtones, and the darkest accents last.

Main colors were raw umber, burnt sienna light, French ochre, imperial purple, jadeite green, permanent orange, serpentine green, and semi-opaque Holbein lavender.

His favorite brushes included Escoda Versatile and Perla flats; Neef mop brushes designed by Thomas; and a modified liner/reservoir brush for tree forms.

The watercolor paper was a quarter sheet of Baohong rough taped to gator board.

He used a slightly angled easel to harness gravity; he does not like using masking fluid; he applied wet-into-wet in shadow.

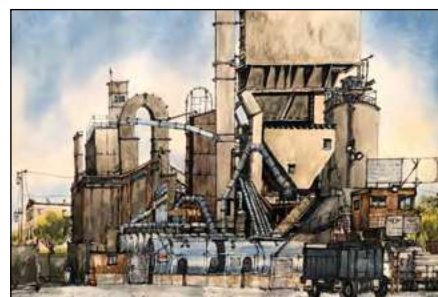

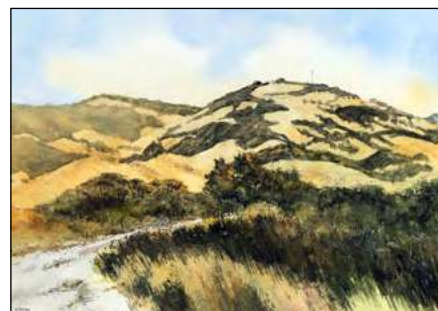

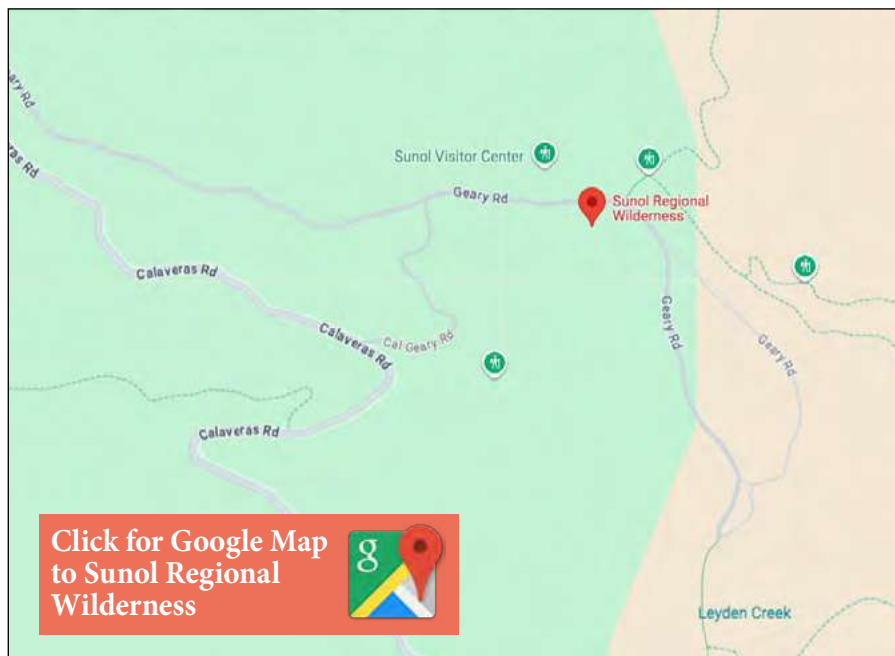
