Following Maori Wisdom Tradition to Find Their Own Year's Vision



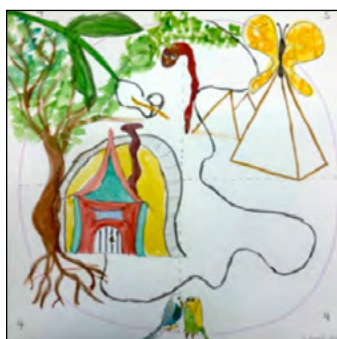
Nancy Redden led our veterans group following an annual exercise practiced by the New Zealand tribe of the Maori people. On a square piece of paper, we drew a circle and then placed eight images: mountain, shelter, snake, tree, flower(s), butterfly, path, and bird. Next, we divided the page into four equal quadrants and delved into the symbols of each. We will each make our own interpretation of what we drew and painted.

The upper left quadrant is the valley of the birds—our thinking and mental territory. The lower left is the valley of the flowers—our emotional territory. The upper right hand is the valley of the mountain—our spiritual territory. And the lower right is the valley of the trees—our physical territory. After finding our quadrants, we counted how many of each symbol image, or even a sliver of the symbol images, was in each. Learning the various meanings of the snake and bird or birds was interesting as we reflected on our year to come.

This group was in a reflective mood as one of our members of 25 years had suddenly passed away. George was a wonderful fellow and a terrific artist. He had many health challenges but was always upbeat. Our group is just one of the many, including his family, who have had the honor of knowing George. Rest in peace, George Archibeque.
