


Community Outreach — Oakland VeteransThe Ladies Take Over the Oakland Vet Group

He has been discipline-free for ten years which qualified him for the Hobby program. Now he has been in the Hobby program for six years and is the Hobby Coordinator. There are 200 artists in the program. His responsibilities are enlisting others in the Hobby program, ordering art supplies from Dick Blick, and giving general art advice. Over the years he has experimented with many mediums, but spends the most time with watercolors. He likes painting landscapes. He writes, "When I am in the process of creating art it promotes inner peace, calm, and I lose track of time. Joining the Hobby program here helps keep my mind focused on art instead of committing another crime." He is looking for a pen pal who can advise on tools that will work across multiple media, e.g., gouache, oil, watercolor, water-soluble graphic, acrylic and more. Also, he would like this pen pal to be a support group that looks at his artwork and gives constructive feedback on how to improve it. He has no access to computer or cell phone, so all communication will have to be via U.S. Mail. That's all. The writer is very polite.
